CAMPGROUND UPDATE

You have probably noticed the piles of dirt at the Campground these days and they have been accompanied by some large holes in the ground. Crescent Point has been remediating some environmental contamination from the early days of oil & gas exploration in the area. Part of this remediation has been to remove the topsoil and clean cover material then haul any contaminated material away and bring clean material in to replace it. This has turned into a larger project than initially anticipated and has resulted in a decision not to open the campground this summer.



We are trying our best to have a solution for camping for Longstock this summer.

The Village is also waiting confirmation on a grant to install water & sewer to part of the campground followed by the construction of a kitchen that can be used by campers & residents in summer and skaters & residents in the winter.

More from Stan Gallup... "The no limit poker games were wild and attracted some pretty big money. Slickers from the city (Calgary) would come in for a weekend game, but they would dress like a typical rigger so no one would recognize them.

The most famous poker spot was in a club in Little New York. It had three rooms – one with a \$1 limit, another with \$10 and the last with no limit at all."

There wasn't a house in town worth moving, but the external manifestations of poverty were offset by the new Fords and Chryslers parked outside.

The "Roughneck Dances" held in Little New York's Roxy Theatre each payday often produced more explosive reactions than the nearby wells.
